Recap of Last 10/4/15 Meeting

Opening/Formation:

Bob Calderon opened the on-going formation discussion with Chapter 6, *Does Your God Love You?* from <u>Catching Fire Becoming Flame</u>. Bob addressed how people constantly change over the years in their journey of faith. He stated that one's upbringing, education, and religious life all contribute to forming one's character. He shared that he spent his early years in a strict Catholic school environment. Bob emphasized that despite one's religious foundation, one's image of God should

change, and if it doesn't then something is wrong. Bob's first question to members was: "Who is God to you?" Notably, Vicky responded immediately with "Best Friend." Others followed with their descriptions. Bob then asked: Does anyone fear God?" whereupon all hands shot up in the air. Finally, members were broken down into small groups to share their answers to the questions that appear on page 40 of the on-going formation book:

What is your current, most common, image of God? How does it foster or challenge you to loving service of your neighbor? How does it hinder you?

Varied responses were given by each team's chosen representatives.

Presentation

Gil Donahue – Franciscans in the Jubilee Year of Mercy: Gil recalled for members that the scriptural focus for the jubilee year will be Christ's command from Luke 6:36, "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful."

Next, he brought to our attention what Pope Francis wrote in Misericordiae Vultus:

"We need constantly to contemplate the mystery of mercy. It is a wellspring of joy, serenity, and peace. Our salvation depends on it.

Mercy: the word reveals the very mystery of the Most Holy Trinity.

Mercy: the ultimate and supreme act by which God comes to meet us.

"Mercy: the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life.

Mercy: the bridge that connects God and man, opening our hearts to hope of being loved forever despite our sinfulness.

"We will entrust the life of the Church, all humanity, and the entire cosmos to the Lordship of Christ, asking him to pour out his mercy upon us like the morning dew, so that everyone may work together to build a brighter future. How much I desire that the year to come will be steeped in mercy, so that we can go out to every man and woman, bringing the goodness and tenderness of God! May the balm of mercy reach everyone, both believers and those far away, as a sign that the Kingdom of God is already present in their midst!"

With this being the first meeting of the calendar year, Gil highlighted Chapter Two" The Way of Life" from the Secular Franciscan Rule as a reminder of how we should conduct our lives as Franciscans.

Spiritual Bouquets

What is a Spiritual Bouquet? Michelle Arnold, a Catholic Answers Apologist, gives this response:

A "spiritual bouquet" is a group of prayers gathered together for a particular intention. The idea is that each prayer is like a flower and that the group is like a bouquet mystically offered as a gift to God for a particular intention. That is why, for example, you'll sometimes see Catholics organize "spiritual bouquets" for particular purposes, such as for the intentions of the Pope in honor of his

birthday. Those who participate promise a certain amount of prayers and devotions for the intention and then the list is compiled and given to the person whose intentions are being remembered in prayer.


