

# Recap of Last Meeting 8/2/17

The Tau general meeting began with an opening prayer read by Clari Claus, OFS. Walter Gawlak, OFS began on-going formation by asking the group about their experience with Journaling from last month's session. He encouraged them to continue to consider using a journal to get in touch with the Holy Spirit or even to jot down passages from the Gospel readings or other spiritual material or phrases that strike them as topics for meditation or inspiration.

Walter then presented the Chapter from *Catching Fire Becoming Flame* on Developing a Rule of Life, explaining that it is not so much a set of rules against which we might fail but rather a trellis that can guide and support our spiritual lives. The Rule of Life can be likened to a more immediate and specific implementation plan for the general guidance provided in the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order. Moreover, the Rule of Life is intended to help us reevaluate our progress in living the Rule, set goals, review our lives and adjust our practices on a periodic basis. Walter encouraged the group to review the four-minute Internet presentation by Margaret Guenther referenced in Going Deeper as a compelling explanation of the benefits of such a plan and a guide to its development.

Finally, Walter asked for the group's opinion of *Catching Fire Becoming Flame* as a basis for on-going formation. The consensus was that the book served as a useful resource and actually helped individual members in their spiritual practice.

Following formation, Bill Richey, OFS gave brief summaries of key points from 3 books about Pope Francis: Bergoglio's List by Nello Scavo; Pope Francis among the Wolves by Marco Politi; and Pope Francis: Life and Revolution by Elisabetta Pique. Nello Scavo covers the period when Jorge Mario Bergoglio was head of the Jesuits in Argentina and he ran an "underground railroad" that helped many people flee Argentina and thus avoid torture and execution by the 1976-1983 military government. Politi and Pique emphasize the unsettling spirit of evangelical poverty that Francis has brought to the Vatican and argue that he envisions a church that is more merciful and pastoral, less centralized, less Eurocentric, less self-referential, and more directly engaged in ministry among the poor and marginalized as instructed in Matthew 25.



#### Reflection on the Exaltation of the Holy Cross

#### The Story of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross

Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman.

The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614, 15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.

**Reflection:** The cross is today the universal image of Christian belief. Countless generations of artists have turned it into a thing of beauty to be carried in procession or worn as jewelry. To the eyes of the first Christians, it had no beauty. It stood outside too many city walls, decorated only with decaying corpses, as a threat to anyone who defied Rome's authority—including Christians who refused sacrifice to Roman gods. Although believers spoke of the cross as the instrument of salvation, it seldom appeared in Christian art unless disguised as an anchor or the Chi-Rho until after Constantine's edict of toleration.
