

Dear Sisters and Brothers.

During our January meeting, Bill Bouffard made a statement about us not keeping our Franciscan spirituality to ourselves. This statement has resonated with me the past few days. As I have thought about what to say in the minister's message this month, Bill's statement kept coming back to me. I believe our fraternity does an excellent job of sharing our Franciscan spirituality - even if we are not aware of what we are doing. Some examples that quickly come to mind are: Jim and Liz recently started the prayer group at St. Leo's; Terry, Jim and Liz make sure that our food donations are delivered to St. Vincent de Paul every month; several members go every other month to the hospice to cook for the sisters; the fraternity has responded with love and generosity to requests from the sisters for the unwed mothers; Clari collects gloves and hats every winter for children in need and you all are very generous for this collection; several of us share the faith by teaching CCD; Bill Richey has a ministry at the jail; and we actively pray for each other and all prayer requests that are sent to us. There are other examples and I apologize if I have forgotten to mention an apostolate in which someone is involved. My point is that several of our members preach the Gospel without really using words - and put our Franciscan spirituality into practice in the works of mercy that are performed without giving it a second thought. When I contemplate how loving and giving you all are, I am in awe. I feel truly blessed to be a part of this fraternity and I thank each and every one of you for blessing me and the others with whom you share your gifts and talents. Recap of Last Meeting 1/7/18

The Tau general meeting began with an opening prayer read by Clari Claus, OFS (provided to her by Veronica O'Donnell, OFS). See page 3 for the prayer. Following the opening prayer, Walter Gawlak, OFS, welcomed our two new Aspirants Nellie Aston and Myrna Medina and our guest Doug Fehrer. He then thanked Jim Haynes, OFS, Kimberley Heatherington, OFS, and Gil Donahue, OFS, who will help with initial formation. Walter then began the Ongoing Formation discussion with a new year resolution for the fraternity members to share and

exchange ideas in an effort to help us live the rule and deepen our commitment to our brothers and sisters and the fraternity as a whole. Pat B. broached the topic of Francis' devotion to Mary and suggested that this year the group could learn more about Mary and how devotion to Mary fits within the Franciscan charism. Bill Bouffard, OFS stated that the ritual says that we can substitute the evening prayer with the crown rosary.

Walter then moved the discussion to the formation book Poverty & Joy, The Franciscan Tradition, by William Short. The fraternity discussed the title and how on the surface the words appear to be opposites, but acknowledged that when we let go of "stuff" it can be freeing and lead to joy. The fraternity also discussed how poverty and joy are characteristics of Jesus and Francis embraced them as he imitated Jesus in living the gospel. Walter mentioned that the book discusses the newness of St. Francis and his way of living the gospel. He encouraged the members to be open to newness. Next month we will discuss Chapters 2 and 3. Walter also passed out a handout from the region entitled "What are the Obligations of a Secular Franciscan?"

Bill Bouffard gave a presentation on the book \$2.00 a Day: Living on Almost Nothing in America by Kathryn Edin and H. Luke Schaefer. He said that the world definition of poverty is income that averages \$2.00 a day. Bill highlighted some of the statistics on poverty from the book and said that the book provides real life stories as examples. He noted that employment strategies such as just in time services and on-call employment, as well as requirements on applications make it difficult for homeless people to find a job. They have no stable address, may not have a stable phone number, and may be discriminated based on their given name or color of skin. Bill added that a study published in November on Northern Virginia illustrates that the same poverty conditions exist in our area as well. Bill will email the study to the fraternity members.

Daily

- Join in the prayer of the Church by reciting a form of Liturgical prayer suitable for Secular Franciscans.
- Try to attend Mass as often as possible.
- · Say morning and night prayers.
- Say prayers before and after every meal.
- Examine your conscience nightly.
- Pray for those in need: sick, suffering, dying, etc.
- Become an example to others through your life style.
- Wear a symbol of your commitment (Tau cross).

Monthly

- Attend regular Fraternity meetings.
- Participate in prayers and Mass.
- Lead a discussion if you wish.
- · Contribute to the Fraternity common fund for apostolates.
- Try to attend a monthly Holy Hour.
- · Go to confession, if needed.
