

Minister's Message

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I don't know about the rest of you, but lately it seems like everywhere I turn there seems to be conflict in the world. I recognize that conflict is not new to our world. Humanity has experienced conflict from the beginning of time. And I am the first to agree that some conflict can be healthy if it gets to a peaceful resolution of issues that need to be discussed and debated in a respectful manner. However, my observation is that the intensity of conflict in the world seems to be increasing. And I wonder if we begin to experience bleed over from the conflict to which we are exposed in the world. We all need to be extra careful to be mindful that we do not allow ourselves to take on by osmosis the conflict from the world. As Secular Franciscans we are called to live our faith out in the world, and to model our Christian faith for those with whom we come into contact. Unfortunately, the reality of being out in the world means that we are exposed to so much negativity. We need to remain focused on our Lord and ask Him to give us strength and guidance and to protect us from absorbing the conflict and negativity. We need to focus on faith, hope, and love - to show compassion and forgiveness. We need to do that to ourselves, to our families, to our sisters and brothers in the fraternity, and to everyone else who crosses our path. We are so blessed to have received this vocation - may we all live our vocation as God intends. Please know that my daily prayers include our fraternity members. You are my family and I am blessed to have each of you in my life. I am looking forward to spending time with you at our retreat next month at Priest Field. Recap of Last Meeting, 4/8/18

We were joined by a visitor Heba Garcia, OFS. She professed in the Secular Franciscan Order 20 years ago. Heba learned about the Tau Fraternity from Father Tickerhoof, who will be leading our retreat. She lives in the area and is interested in transferring to our Fraternity.

Walter Gawlak, OFS began the Ongoing Formation discussion with reflections about how Easter is special to Franciscans. Many of the Lenten traditions came from the Franciscans. The Stations of the Cross originated by Franciscans in the Holy Land and spread to churches worldwide. Tau fraternity has had rich opportunities to obtain grace this Lent through leading Stations of the Cross, participating the Lenten Day of Spirituality, and participating at the Day of Reflection at the Shrine of St. Anthony. Walter remarked that the Gospel reading this morning about communal living where people sell everything, and no one owns anything is Franciscan. He mentioned that the Franciscan Friars of the Renewal is starting a new video series. One of the videos is called "God's Providence or Nachos".

After remarks about Lent and Easter, Walter began the Ongoing Formation with the small group discussions on Chapter 3 "The Poverty and Humility of Our Lord Jesus Christ" from the formation book *Poverty & Joy, The Franciscan Tradition*, by William Short. He asked a set of questions for group discussion and provided a reflection from St. John's Abbey, Don Talafous, OSB for everyone to contemplate.

Following Ongoing Formation, Veronica O'Donnell, OFS gave a presentation on St. Hildegard von Bingen. She attended a program of St. Hildegard's music at the National Cathedral. St. Hildegard is one of the four women Doctors of the Church. She is known as Sibyl of the Rhine. St. Hildegard was born the 10<sup>th</sup> child of aristocrat parents who tithed her to the Benedictines. She was anchoress to a holy woman Jutta. She confided her visions only to Jutta. Jutta told Chaplain Volmar.

At the age of 13, St. Hildegard took a vow of virginity. When Jutta died, the nuns unanimously voted Hildegard Abbess. In a vision, St. Hildegard was told to find her own place; she designed her own abbey in Rupertsberg near Bingen. It was one of the first with indoor plumbing! St. Hildegard agreed to bury a man who had been excommunicated. She removed all the headstones in the cemetery at the abbey to bury him there. Because of the controversy and disobedience, the clergy interdicted her by disallowing Mass, sacraments, and the divine office at the abbey.

St. Hildegard envisioned the universe as a huge egg with all of creation inside with God. Veronica passed around images that St. Hildegard created. St. Hildegard was an artist, an herbalist, and a composer. At the end of the presentation, Veronica did a drawing for an icon of St. Hildegard. Kimberley Heatherington, OFS was the lucky winner!




## Our Lady, Queen of Heaven and Earth

### Excerpt from A Paschal Homily from St. John Chrysostom

If any be a devout lover of God, let him partake with gladness from this fair and radiant feast.

If any be a faithful servant, let him enter rejoicing into the joy of his Lord.

If any have wearied himself with fasting, let him now enjoy his reward,

If any have labored from the first hour, let him receive today his rightful due.

If any have come after the third, let him celebrate the feast with thankfulness.

If any come after the sixth, let him not be in any doubt, for he will suffer no loss.

If any have delayed until the ninth, let him not hesitate but draw near.

If any have arrived only at the eleventh, let him not be afraid because he comes so late.

For the Master is generous and accepts the last even as the first.

He gives rest to him who comes at the eleventh hour in the same way as him who labored from the first.

He accepts the deed and commends the intention.

Enter then, all of you, into the joy of our Lord.

First and last, receive alike your reward.

Rich and poor, dance together.

You who fasted and you who have not fasted, rejoice together.

The table is fully laden: let all enjoy it.

The calf is fatted: let none go away hungry.

Let none lament his poverty; for the universal Kingdom is revealed.

Let none bewail his transgressions; for the light of forgiveness has risen from the tomb.

Let none fear death; for death of the Savior has set us free.
