PRESENTATION

The Tau Fraternity open house immediately preceded the opening prayer. Pam Brooks, OFS congratulated the newly professed, and she welcomed the visitors to the Tau Fraternity open house. She introduced Bill Bouffard, OFS, who gave a brief presentation. Bill talked about the importance of community and our Franciscan charisms of living the gospel by following in Jesus' footsteps in the way of St. Francis of Assisi. MISSIONARIES OF CHARITY COOKING HOSPICE

7 a.m., drive to northeast D.C. and share our stories along the way. We cook for 60 people, including the other volunteers who work that day. Mother Teresa's nuns look in on us to make sure we know where kitchen wares can be found. They always express their gratitude to us with their great smiles. We're usually back at St. Joseph's parking lot by noon. Come and join us at least once. It's a heartwarming ministry.

INDIVIDUAL APOSTOLATES

Mother of Mercy Free Clinic - The professed excused continue to participate as prayer warriors for Mother of Mercy Free Clinic in Manassas, VA. Thanks to many of the brothers and sisters of Tau Fraternity, a box of rosaries, prayer cards, medals and other religious items were sent in October to be shared with the patients. St. Jude's Ranch for Children - Sally is collecting greeting cards. Used cards will be re-purposed by the St. Jude's Ranch for Children. Please save the front of the cards (NOT Disney, Hallmark or American Greetings), and bring them to the Monthly Tau meeting. Also, if you have unused greeting cards, please bring them also. Sally supports the Military Mama Network by sending Christmas cards to active duty military personnel on deployment, and she sends the other cards to deployed troops and to families of veterans who have lost their lives. Helping Homeless Veterans - We have many homeless veterans in our immediate area. The Loudoun Elks in Sterling, Virginia, has a grant from the federal government to help provide and furnish housing for homeless veterans. The Elks' program has found housing for over forty veterans and family members since the organization received the grant. Many of these homeless veterans have only a few possessions and have been living outside in dire conditions such as sheltering under bridges. Some veterans are mothers with small children. So even when moving into an apartment, the participants need household goods especially bedding and other linens.

There is an easy way for you to help. The Elks representative said that there is a real need for new and gently used towels, blankets, sheets (sizes queen, full and twin), pillow cases, bed spreads etc. New pillows are needed as well.

During November and December Sally and Vera will be collecting any linens you can donate. Please bring them to the monthly meetings or drop them off at Sally's home. Warm Clothing Drives – Clari Claus, OFS is collecting hats, scarves, gloves, mittens and the like to needy children at Herndon Elementary School. Cash donations are also welcome; Clari will do the shopping for you! Please bring any and all donations to our November gathering.

Vera is collecting winter clothing for a couple of coat drives. St. John the Apostle Catholic Church in Leesburg collects new and gently used coats, caps, gloves, and scarves that the Knights of Columbus will deliver to Assumption Parish in Keyser, WV, where a large percentage of the population lives in poverty. The Knights are collecting the items in the church parking lot on the weekend of November 10 & 11.

Also, The Loudoun County Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. (LCAC DST) will be collecting new coats and blankets. The items will be sorted and bagged on December 1, 2018 at Oak Grove Baptist Church in Sterling. Items will be donated to local shelters. Last year, items were delivered to the Volunteers of America Chesapeake Leesburg Homeless Shelter and The Resourceful Women's Thrift Store, which is run by the Loudoun Abused Women's Shelter. Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. is a private, not-for-profit organization whose purpose is to provide assistance and support through established programs in local communities throughout the world. The warm clothing drive is just one of the community service projects out of a variety of programs and projects supporting the sorority's five-point programmatic thrust, which includes educational development, economic development, international awareness and involvement, physical and mental health, and political awareness and involvement. Both the content and the manner in which it is given bother us or even offend. Jesus says in the Sermon on the Mount, among many other equally disturbing things: "You must be made perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). The manner: a command! The content: to be perfect!


We have a hard time picturing ourselves as perfect; we're so aware of our irritability, self-seeking, wrong desires, rash judgments. In the context of earlier words about loving not just friends but enemies, what Jesus is saying makes a bit more sense. He has asked that we be like the rain and sun which do not distinguish among human beings. Our love, too, should be all-embracing, extending way beyond the people we naturally like or who are close to us.

This is a bit more specific than being perfect like God is perfect, though it certainly isn't any easier! Our love and good will are so easily drawn by certain kinds of people, by such externals as their appearance, their smiles, their personalities and, let's admit it, their class and customs, their manners. Jesus asks us to do so much more than that: to love the unlovely, the unattractive, the downright painful, the irritating, the uncongenial, the ones who don't seem to care a bit about us. We would be doing well if we simply tried today and then the day after and so on to show some genuine kindness to someone for whom we have no natural attraction. By such small steps we might work toward this steep ideal of loving everyone.
