RECAP OF LAST MEETING

OPENING PRAYER

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

-JOHN 1:14

Let us begin this Advent journey with a glimpse of the ending. Let me begin with a quote from twentieth-century writer G.K. Chesterton: "When a person has found something which he prefers to life itself, he [sic] for the first time has begun to live." Jesus in his proclamation of the kingdom told us what we could prefer to life itself and it would work! The Bible ends by telling us we are called to be a people who could say, "Come, Lord Jesus" (Revelation 22:20), who could welcome something more than business as usual and live in God's Big Picture. We all have to ask for the grace to prefer something to our small life itself because we have been offered the shared Life, the One Life, the Eternal Life, God's Life that became visible in this world in Jesus. We do not get there by being correct. We get there by allowing the connection. It is like a free wireless connection! The kingdom is finally to be identified as the Lord Jesus himself. When we say "Come, Lord Jesus" on this Christmas Day, we are preferring his Lordship to any other loyalty system or any other final frame of reference.

If Jesus is Lord, then Caesar is not! If Jesus is Lord, then the economy and stock market are not! If Jesus is Lord, then my house and possessions, family and job are not! If Jesus is Lord, then I am not! That multileveled implication was obvious to first century members of the Roman Empire because the phrase

Or as we Franciscans love to say, "Incarnation is already Redemption." The problem is solved. Now go and utterly enjoy all remaining days. Not only is it "Always Advent," but every day can now be Christmas because the one we thought we were just waiting for has come *once and for all*.

REFLECT

Today just "taste and see the goodness of the Lord" (Psalm 34.8)

"Caesar is Lord" was the empire's loyalty test and political bumper sticker. They, and others, knew they had changed "parties" when they welcomed Jesus as Lord instead of the Roman emperor as their savior.

What we are all searching for is Someone to surrender to, something we can prefer to life itself. Well here is the wonderful surprise: God is the only one we can surrender to without losing ourselves. The irony is that we find ourselves, and now in a whole new field of meaning. This happens on a lesser level in every great love in our lifetime, but it is always a leap of faith ahead of time. We are never sure it will be true beforehand. It is surely counter-intuitive, but it is the promise that came into the world on this Christmas Day, "full of grace and of truth." Jesus is the gift totally given, free for the taking, once and for all, to everybody and all of creation. This Cosmic Risen Christ really is *free wireless*, and all we have to do is connect.

Henceforth humanity has the right to know that it is *good to be human, good to live on this earth, good to have a body,* because God in Jesus chose and said "yes" to our humanity.

ONGOING FORMATION

Walter Gawlak, OFS began the discussion with a brief recap of Chapter 4 "Signs of Holiness" from Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation on the Call to Holiness "Gaudete et Exsultate." He divided the members into small groups to discuss experience with the following aspects that were discussed last month:

- Perseverance, patience, and weakness;
- Joy and sense of humor;
- Boldness and passion or evangelization;
- Community.

After the discussion, Walter began discussion on Chapter 5 "Spiritual Combat." He noted that we have three opponents: (1) worldly ways, (2) human weakness, and (3) the devil. He said that a person may reason that he is a good person because he hasn't killed anyone. Some people no longer believe in hell or the devil and therefore believe that they can do what they want. Walter cautioned that we must be alert and watch out for the devil; he wants your soul. He asked the following questions:

- Do you ever detect the devil working in your life?
- Can you identify the characteristics of the devil working in your life?

Walter said that to combat the devil, we need discernment. The devil is like a military general. He does surveillance for the weakest spot. He looks at our virtues. Walter asked:

- Do you know what those links are? Are they weaknesses?
- How do we find our weaknesses, and what do we do about them?
- When was the last time you prayed for discernment? What Happened? How do you know when you get an answer from God?

MISSIONARIES OF CHARITY COOKING HOSPICE

Our fraternity cooks for the Gift of Peace hospice on the second Saturday every other month. St. John Neumann Parish provides \$200 for us to buy groceries. Four or more of us meet at St. Joseph's parking lot at 7 a.m., drive to northeast D.C. and share our stories along the way. We cook for 60 people, including the other volunteers who work that day. Mother Teresa's nuns look in on us to make sure we know where kitchen wares can be found. They always express their gratitude to us with their great smiles. We're usually back at St. Joseph's parking lot by noon. Come and join us at least once. It's a heartwarming ministry.

been living outside in dire conditions such as sheltering under bridges. Some veterans are mothers with small children. So even when moving into an apartment, the participants need household goods especially bedding and other linens. MISSIONARIES OF CHARITY PROFESSION

Seven Missionaries of Charity Sisters Profess Final Vows



Congratulations to the Washington, DC-based Missionaries of Charity and the seven newly professed Sisters at the Gift of Peace House, where the nuns run a hospice and convent. The Sisters made their final vows on Saturday, December 8, with a mass and profession service held in the Crypt of the nearby Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception.

Because of the Tau Fraternity's long-term relationship with the Sisters, the entire Fraternity was invited to attend the mass and ceremony. Pat and Joe did so and were warmly greeted by the Sisters at the Basilica. Several of the Sisters with whom the Fraternity's volunteers have worked over the last few years, including one of the newly professed, expressed their joy at having Secular Franciscans at the event. But not as much joy as we experienced in being there! The profession ceremony was quite moving, with a choir comprised of the Sister's next class to be professed, and the Sisters' families in attendance, some from other countries . . . and other volunteers, Sisters

attending from other parts of the country, and those hospice patients well enough to be there, all sharing in a truly joyous day.

After the formal profession ceremony, some of the Sisters invited us to come back with them to the convent. It was amazing. The last to arrive was the van full of the newly professed Sisters. They exited the van at the bottom of the long winding driveway that leads to the Otis Street hospice, where many of the already professed Sisters were waiting for them, including some from other Missionaries of Charity convents. The already professed nuns walked up the long driveway first, singing beautifully, and performing movements to the words of the song that looked like a liturgical dance. The newly professed Sisters walked behind them. It was near dusk as they reached the top of the hill, and the newly professed Sisters stood together watching the others welcome them with what we were told is a tradition going back to professions with Mother Teresa herself.

While the Sisters welcomed the newly professed, other nuns and hospice patients could be seen standing on the second floor porch and looking out of the windows of the hospice. Inside, we had a buffet dinner and cake and traditional Mexican music performed by one of the Sisters' family members. Joy and more joy!

In one of the hymn's at the Basilica, the Sisters sang:

"Here I am Lord, with great joy. I accept all to the end of my life, and I'll smile at your hidden Face as I surrender myself to you."

AN INSPIRATIONAL WORD

This excerpt is from a letter written by the Franciscan priest Fra Giovanni on Christmas Eve 1513 to his friend the Countess Allagia degl' Aldobrandeschi in Florence:

Within Our Reach: Joy!

I salute you. I am your friend, and my love for you goes deep. There is nothing I can give you which you have not. But there is much, very much, that, while I cannot give it, you can take. No heaven can come to us unless our hearts find rest in it today. Take heaven! No peace lies in the future which is not hidden in this present little instant.

Take peace! The gloom of the world is but a shadow. Behind it, yet within our reach, is joy. There is radiance and glory in darkness, could we but see. And to see, we have only to look. I beseech you to look!

Life is so generous a giver. But we, judging its gifts by their covering, cast them away as ugly or heavy or hard. Remove the covering, and you will find beneath it a living splendor, woven of love by wisdom, with power. Welcome it, grasp it, and you touch the angel's hand that brings it to you.

Everything we call a trial, a sorrow or a duty, believe me, that angel's hand is there. The gift is there and the wonder of an overshadowing presence. Your joys, too, be not content with them as joys. They, too, conceal diviner gifts.

Life is so full of meaning and purpose, so full of beauty beneath its covering, that you will find earth but cloaks your heaven. Courage then to claim it; that is all! But courage you have, and the knowledge that we are pilgrims together, wending through unknown country home.
