# RECAP OF LAST MEETING

#### OPFNING PRAYER

Joe M. read the opening prayer:

Because May is the month that the Church dedicates to Mary, we read a prayer that St. Francis wrote about Mary.

St. Francis was among the greatest Marian devotees in the history of the Church and, according to the *Second Vita* of Thomas of Celano, had a love for her that was beyond words. "Inexpressible," he writes of Francis' love for the Blessed Virgin, "for it was she who made the Lord of majesty our brother." St. Francis chose her as the patroness and Queen of the Friars Minor and exhorted his friars to always possess a true and living devotion to the Mother of God. This loving devotion is imbued in his famous Salutation to the Blessed Virgin Mary:

Hail, O Lady, Mary, holy Mother of God: you are the Virgin made Church and the one chosen by the most holy Father in heaven whom He consecrated with His most holy beloved Son and with the Holy Spirit the Paraclete, in whom there was and is the fullness of grace and every good.

Hail His Palace!
Hail His Tabernacle!
Hail His Home!
Hail His Robe!
Hail His Servant!
Hail His Mother!



And hail all you holy virtues which through the grace and light of the Holy Spirit and poured into the hearts of the faithful so that from their faithless state you may make them faithful to God.

## ONGOING FORMATION

Walter Gawlak, OFS began ongoing formation with a recap of Chapter 4 "A Good Lamp" and an overview of Chapter 5 "Accountability IS Sustainability" from <u>Breathing Underwater: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps</u>, by Richard Rohr. He mentioned that we tend to hurt people, and a self-inventory should help us to understand ourselves better. Step 5 of the 12-step program is to admit to self and others the things we did wrong. Similarly, the chapter is about the nature of our wrongs. After the brief summary, we broke into small groups to discuss the following questions:

- What did you get out of Chapter 5? Did it raise your consciousness?
- Does penance mean something different for converts?
- Do we need to recognize communal guilt before moving on?

#### Presentation

Denis Dunn gave a presentation on contemplative prayer, specifically mysticism. Denis mentioned that he was a student of Richard Rohr at his Living School - Center for Action and Contemplation. There he met students of different faiths, focusing on mysticism. Rohr's philosophy is that to be effective, prayer requires a revolution of the heart; social action will take care of itself. At the living school, mystics would guest lecture.

The German theologian Meister Eckhart, a Dominican, was highly intellectual and at the same time gave sermons that touched people emotionally. He was seen as the mystic's mystic. He was noted for non-dual consciousness. For a more in-depth view, Denis recommends the book *The Way of Paradox: Spiritual Life as Taught by Meister Eckhart*. Eckhart said that there are two ways to go up a mountain: 1) follow the winding path, the sacraments, and 2) a life of detachment, contemplative prayer.

Christian asceticism deals with the false self. To know your true self, you must rid yourself of the false self. To be open to God, you must allow the birth of God in your soul. Before transformation, we pray to God; after transformation, we pray through God.

Matthew Foy, a mystic and biographer of Eckhart, said regarding the Holy Trinity that laughter and birthing go on all of the time:

The Father laughs with the Son.

The Son laughs with the Father.

The Father likes the Son.

The Son likes the Father.

The Father delights in the Son.

The Son delights in the Father.

The Father loves the Son.

The Son loves the Father.

This is the Holy Spirit: laughing, liking, delighting, loving.

#### INDIVIDUAL APOSTOLATES

Mother of Mercy Free Clinic – The Clinic Director of Mother of Mercy Free Clinic is asking for prayers. ## **PIVOTAL PLAYERS**

At the May Tau Gathering, Joe M., OFS mentioned a free online series during the month of May on Bishop Barron's Word on Fire website. Below is a summary of the first three episodes.

## Episode #1: St. Francis of Assisi

St. Francis provides a wakeup call that the gospel can be lived out. He essentially opts out of the whole system where we seek ego satisfaction. Instead, he discovers that by ruthlessly denying oneself of all that we want, we experience the perfect joy of closeness of God.

## **Episode #2: St. Thomas Aquinas**

St. Thomas makes theological breakthroughs by incorporating reason rather than asking the faithful to suspend disbelief. Faith is not below reason. If God is truth, science and math flow from God. By constantly asking "What is God?", the saint asserts that God is not a supreme being but rather the essence of being itself. St. Thomas conception largely defines God by what He is not. God is infinite, immaterial and immutable. Things exist because God knowed them into existence. This is God of Psalm 139, the Old Testament God of the burning bush. God is the answer to why there is something rather than nothing.

#### Episode #3: St. Catherine of Sienna

The mystic at age 7 saw an image of Christ on a throne dressed like the Pope. She lived an aesthetic and celibate life. She had regular conversations with the saints, Virgin Mary and Jesus. Famous work was formulated as a conversation with God. She derived an unusual sense of power where she got an appointment with the Pope and convinced him to move back to Rome. She conceived sin as a raging river and Jesus as the bridge from heaven to Earth. She elaborates on three stairs on the bridge. Stair 1 represents beginners of spiritual life fearing God; Stair 2 represents those that love God but based on

spiritual benefits and Stair 3 is a filial love of God where the purest sign is the acceptance of suffering. Participation in crucified Christ means death to the Ego. Participation is dynamic either moving forward or backward.
