# **RECAP OF LAST MEETING**

#### **OPENING PRAYER**

Pat B., OFS read a prayer to Saint Anne:

#### **ONGOING FORMATION**

Walter Gawlak, OFS began ongoing formation with a recap of Chapter 6 from <u>Breathing Underwater:</u> <u>Spirituality and the Twelve Steps</u>, by Richard Rohr, remarking that we are ready for God to remove defects of character. He said that we have to have readiness and admit helplessness. Some points he highlighted are:

- The 12 step pilgrimage is an ongoing invitation for God to deepen our spirituality.
- On the way, we ask self questions. If the questions are uncomfortable, that is good.
- Going deeper toward wisdom leads us to happiness.
- Wisdom will help us to lessen the need for control.

After the recap, Walter introduced Chapter 7. In this chapter we humbly ask God to remove our shortcomings. Walter asked the following questions:

- 1. Have you ever treated God like a vending machine?
- 2. What do you think when God answers those prayers?
- 3. Did you pray differently?

Based on group discussion, Walter noted that the relationship with God changes us. He reminded us that there will be no ongoing formation in August due to elections. Walter provided the following suggestions:

- Keep a gratitude journal. See if there are changes over time.
- Try to imagine what you would be like if God removed your character flaws.

#### **PRESENTATION**

Kimberley Heatherington, OFS gave a presentation on Pope Francis' views on migrants and refugees. Sunday, September 29, 2019 is the World Day of Migrants and Refugees, 2019. Since 2014, Pope Francis has provided messages about migrants and refugees. Some notable things he said are:

- 2014:
  - Each individual is a part of humanity, not pawns.
  - We should manage the issue via international cooperation that begins with addressing the root problems that motivate emigration.
  - A change of attitude is needed. We need to get away from the throw away culture and move toward a culture of encounter. We must encounter them as human beings.
  - Migrants and refugees are brothers and sisters to be welcomed and loved.
- 2015:
  - Jesus calls us to share.
  - We start with the dignity of the human person.
  - There are various causes of migration and refugee movement such as economic migration, civil war, terrorism or fear for one's life.
- 2016:
  - Immigration can be the result of a humanitarian crisis; the crisis is worsened if met by others with silence or complacency.
  - Migrants and refugees are our brothers and sisters in search of a better life.
  - We are called to welcome the stranger. It is an opportunity to encounter Jesus Christ.
- 2017:
  - Migration affects all continents.
  - Children are first to pay the toll.
  - Issues are child trafficking, abuse, and absence of rights.
  - Children are invisible and voiceless.
  - We need to work toward protection, integration, and a long term solution.
  - There is need for pastoral guidance/responsibility to welcome, protect, promote, and integrate.

Refugees are not "illegal." They are protected by the United Nations. Kimberley recommended Pope Francis' book *Migrants and Refugees: Witnesses to Hope*. It is available from the US Conference of Catholic Bishops

#### INDIVIDUAL APOSTOLATES

Vera Stewart, OFS participates in various community service projects through the Loudoun County Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. The sorority was founded in 1913 by 22 young women at Howard University. They founded it upon Christian principles with the intent to serve the black community. Since its founding, Delta Sigma Theta has participated in many public service initiatives, which are now organized in its five-point programmatic thrust of educational development, economic development, international awareness and involvement, physical and mental health, and political awareness and involvement. Most recently, the sorority held its national convention this July in New Orleans, but the convention abruptly ended early due to Tropical Storm Barry. The sorority's response was to donate food, amounting to 17,000 meals, for disaster relief. 



As Customs and Border Protection and Immigration and Customs Enforcement release refugees into Southern New Mexico, the Diocese of Las Cruces provides them with basic Christian hospitality. The ministry provides food, shelter, safety, and clothing to the refugees, The ministry constantly needs personal travel size hygiene supplies, lip balm, hairbrushes, hair ties, small and medium belts, shoelaces, new underwear and socks for children and adults (Sm./Med.)

## FRANCISCAN SERVANT LEADERSHIP

From: Handbook for Franciscan Servant Leadership, Rev 2010

Franciscan servant leadership is always rooted in conversion. Ongoing conversion-penance-is the fundamental, dominant charism for Secular Franciscans, and is central in our lives. None of us has arrived, and we need to be aware of the need for openness to the grace that will lead us to "right faith, certain hope, and perfect charity" (cf. Francis' Prayer Before the Crucifix, in Armstrong and Brady, p. 103). Franciscan values of ongoing conversion, minority, poverty, and prayer are crucial elements, which underpin a leader's behavior, but each leader brings his or her own unique personality, style, and attitudes to the role. Because conversion is an ongoing process, dynamic growth will continue to shape the ideals as well as practical application of leadership.

In this spirit of ongoing conversion, we remember that Christ is the true leader, and we follow. We hear the call, express our commitment, and recognize the vision. Acting as servant leaders, we share our gifts and encourage others to share theirs. We understand that he best leadership is collaborative. We recognize that there is a place for each one of us, and we value our differences.
