Minister's Message

Brothers and Sisters,

Peace and all good!

In December, I attended two retirement parties. I knew each of the retirees fairly well, but during the speeches and ceremonies, I learned something new about them. Both celebrations were very touching and, of course, got me thinking about my own remaining runway in the workforce.

I've organized my work life and personal life around discrete goals: get promoted, earn a certification, run a certain time in a marathon, climb Mt. Rainier, get my kids into colleges of a certain caliber. This approach has kept me disciplined, which is unambiguously a good thing. However, there is something funny about discrete goals. Once you achieve them, they need to be reloaded; otherwise, a certain emptiness can ensue.

Bill Burnett and Dave Evans, in *Designing Your Life*, state the following: "A well-designed life is a life that is generative — it is constantly creative, productive, changing, evolving, and there is always the possibility of surprise." Continuous goal-setting fits nicely into the concept of a generative life. But the nature of those goals needs to evolve, and perhaps we need to concede some control to God to guide this process. There is a certain openness and self-awareness required to keep us from setting superficial goals that don't feed our evolving spiritual needs.

Since our careers are often so defining in how we design our lives, retirement becomes a true test of whether our life design is creative, productive, changing, evolving, and capable of surprise. In retirement speeches, there are inevitably references to the fact that time is short and to appreciate every moment. While this is sound advice, it doesn't guide us in how we should organize our activities to be fully present.

As Catholics and Secular Franciscans, we have discussed and practiced various forms of prayer to encourage a well-designed life. Certainly, the Rule to which we professed provides some clarity. As the New Year approaches and there is talk of resolutions, let's not be complacent. Let's not just think of something to do differently; instead, let's focus on intentionality of purpose.



PRESENTATION


Thanks to the organization and preparation by Cyndy Filan-Kim, OFS, a festive Christmas party was enjoyed in place of the monthly presentation.

ONGOING FORMATION

Bill Richey, OFS led a group discussion on "Let Us Begin Again – An Advent Invitation" by Diane Houdek, published on Franciscan Media. The focus was on her two favorite quotes:

"I have two favorite quotes from Saint Francis. The first is "Let us begin again, for until now we have done nothing." Francis said this as he was nearing his death, knowing that conversion is never a single moment but a lifelong journey. We constantly need to renew our commitment to Christ, to following the Gospel, to drawing closer to God. Advent, the beginning of a new liturgical year, is a perfect time to begin again, a fresh start for each of us."

"My second favorite Francis quote is, "I have done what is mine to do. May Christ show you what is yours to do." Francis knew that it was important that those who followed him never lost sight of the fact that they were ultimately following Christ. It's not about a slavish imitation of a man who lived in the Middle Ages in a small town in central Italy but about seeing through his life the message of Christ for all people in all times and places."

Bill Bouffard is now the Tau liaison with the First Baptist Church of Herndon for the English class apostolate. Bill teaches the Intermediate classes and will be coordinating Tau's volunteers.

The Fall Semester has been a big success! Volunteers registered 32 students from 12 countries. There are 19 students in the Beginners class, 7 in the Intermediate Class, and 6 in the Advanced class.

Everyone worked together to create a very streamlined process with all the required stations covered! The new furniture that we were able to get with our grant money from the Herndon Moose Lodge has enhanced our classrooms with improved tables, chairs and storage cabinets and the flip charts and overhead projector have been very beneficial for our teacher presentations.

The classes will be moving to new rooms in the church over the Christmas holidays. The new rooms are larger with closets and a separate entrance to the church.

1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY— JANUARY 18-25, 2025

The theme of the *Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2025* is based on a text from the Gospel of John: "Do you believe this?" (John 11:26). The prayers and reflections have been prepared by the brothers and sisters of the monastic community of Bose in northern Italy. As usual, an international team appointed jointly by the Vatican Dicastery for the Promotion of Christian Unity and the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches worked with the authors to finalize the materials.

The year 2025 will mark the 1,700th anniversary of the First Ecumenical Council. This commemoration provides a unique opportunity to reflect on and celebrate the common faith of Christians as expressed in the Creed formulated at that Council. The *Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2025* is an invitation to draw on this common heritage and to enter more deeply into the faith that unites all Christians.




