Minister's Message

Brothers and Sisters,

This month is dedicated to the Holy Face and Redemption. In preparing for the Minister's message, I engaged in the Devotion to the Holy Face for the first time. It was a profound reminder that we are always called to seek His presence. We are to repent for our sins, especially those against the first three commandments, which teach us how we ought to relate to God and what honors or dishonors Him. This reflection brings to mind the gospel passage: "No one can serve two masters" (Matthew 6:24).

It is easy to compartmentalize our time with God — to tell Him, "I'll be back in a second" as we rationalize time spent on activities that are less God-centered. Sometimes, this separation serves as an excuse for sin. Other times, however, while I may perceive myself as being away from God, I am still serving His purpose. This is a reminder that even in the more mundane moments of life, we are in this world but not of this world (John 17:14-16).

Our redemption follows a three-step process: justification, sanctification, and glorification. For Secular Franciscans, justification may be found in our Profession, which deepens the grace of our baptism. Sanctification is our daily conversion — living the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order, bringing the Gospel to life and life to the Gospel. Glorification will come when we are fully transformed into the image of Christ, though we are given glimpses of it even now.

The Devotion to the Holy Face seems especially fitting in our Lenten journey. I will be praying this month that Lent strengthens your resolve, deepens your purpose, and draws you ever closer to living in the presence of the Most High.

- **Lisa Jaeger, OFS,** teaches ESL virtually, participates in the Winchester Food Bank and regularly provides the laundry detergent for two Winchester homes for pregnant women and new moms. She's also an adorer for her home parish Adoration Chapel & a Legion of Mary associate.
- **Vera Stewart, OFS,** is currently looking for an apostolate after moving to Lexington, SC. She helps with the Lexington Food Bank and donates to charities in the area.
- **Joe Boyle, OFS,** is a SJCC Eucharistic Minister which has provided him the opportunity to form relationships with those he visits in their homes. This personal contact is very special to him.
- **Cecilia Thieman, OFS,** devotes 2-3 hours to morning prayer, calls South African priests to request prayers for others, and cooks for her home parish priests.
- **Jen Raimo, Candidate,** works with underserved populations as an attorney and teaches 3rd grade CCD.






