

RECAP OF AUGUST 3 GATHERING

ONGOING FORMATION

Stanley Hoover read the Mass readings for Sunday July 6, 2025 and then read the sermon preached that day by Father Dominic T.O.R. at Saint Joseph's. (Father Dominic had given him a copy.) The readings for the Mass were Isaiah 66:10-14, Galatians 6: 14-18, and Luke 10: 1-12, 17-20.

What follows is a summary of some key points from Father Dominic's homily that Stanley read to us:

Life is not easy these days. There is much suffering. But we are not forgotten. God is with us. God is our comfort, strength, and mission. In Isaiah, God compares His love to a mother. He will comfort us like a mother comforts her child. We are not alone. God wants to be our strength, He gives us comfort, gentleness, healing.

In Galatians Paul reminds us that love means sacrifice. Many of us have Crosses in our daily lives. Paul tells us not to hide from our Crosses because in that pain Jesus is with us. Our Crosses come when we forgive, when we remain faithful, when we serve those who cannot repay us. Paul tells us that is where God's grace flows.

In the Gospel Luke tells us that the harvest is great but the laborers are few. All of us are sent. Our mission field is our workplace, our home, kitchen, phone conversations, classrooms, hospital shifts. Jesus says go, bring peace, bring me to others. We are not sent alone, we need each other, we need community. We bring peace, that is what the world is craving. We are not to worry about applause or appreciation. We just stay faithful, God sees it all. Every little sacrifice is written in Heaven. Here is the message for today:

If you are tired, God wants to comfort you like a mother.

If you are suffering, hold your Cross. It is not a punishment, it is a blessing.

If you are wondering what to do with your life, Jesus is sending you today.

If you feel small or unnoticed, remember your name is written in heaven.

Go with a mission. And let your life speak of God's love. You are not a face in the crowd. You are chosen, sent, and loved. Amen.

Stanley concluded his contribution to ongoing formation with much praise for Father Mark-Mary Ames' work: his book *Habits for Holiness*, his podcast "The Rosary in a Year," and a new book entitled *Eight Promises of God: Discovering Hope Through the Beatitudes*, with its strong theme of blessedness.

RECAP OF AUGUST 3 GATHERING

ONGOING FORMATION (CONTINUED)

This session ended with a brief discussion of Stephen Colbert's interview with Anderson Cooper about the death of Cooper's mother. Colbert had lost family members in an airplane crash, and he found much solace in Christ's suffering on the Cross. Josh said the interview was remarkable for such a candid discussion of Catholic faith on TV, and he would try to find it and send it out to the group.

PRESENTATION

Carlos Mariño, Veronica O'Donnell's Orthodox friend, gave a presentation on agreements and differences between the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox forms of Christianity.

What follows is a summary of some key points of his presentation.

There have been many schisms and separations, but there are also many areas of agreement, such as sources of doctrine, the nature of God and the Holy Trinity, Christology, the Seven Sacraments, the Eucharist as the real Body and Blood, salvation through faith and works, Mariology, veneration of saints, inclusion of the departed, and bodily resurrection.

Carlos pointed out that the two branches also agree on what they reject: only the Bible (sola scriptura), faith alone (sola fide), "once saved always saved," predestination, and penal substitutionary atonement (God punished Jesus as a substitute for humanity's punishment).

Carlos noted that "East is East and West is West" in terms of cultural roots, temperament (intuitive, mystical, contemplative vs. rational, juridical), theological approach (emphasis on mystery and experience vs. philosophical and scholastic), and organizational mindset (conciliar vs. centralized).

"Major disagreements" concern the role of the Papacy (supremacy vs. primacy), infallibility, autocephalous (self-governing) churches, the Filioque (whether the Holy Spirit proceeds from both the Father and the Son), ancestral vs. original sin, the immaculate conception of Mary, purgatory, limbo, and hell.

In the handout Carlos also addressed "lesser disagreements," such as the mode of baptism, divorce or the date of Easter, and other ways in which the two forms of Christianity are "simply different," such as leavened or unleavened bread for the Eucharist, married priests, postures of prayer, and the sign of the cross.



Nostra Aetate at 60: Legacy and Challenges for Reconciliation and Interreligious Understanding

September 15-16 Georgetown University Hilltop Campus

Nostra Aetate is more relevant today than it was as a remarkable achievement 60 years ago when promulgated at Vatican II. Shortest of its 16 documents, with 436 of its 1,174 words dedicated to Jewish relations, Nostra Aetate repudiated past Catholic teachings about Jews, Muslims, and the followers of other religions and provided principles for dialogue and cooperation.

This conference will explore the new challenges for Christian-Jewish and interreligious relations in general, measuring the depth of *Nostra Aetate*'s legacy.



The Transitus of Saint Francis is a yearly celebration by Franciscans around the world on October 3rd to commemorate the death of St. Francis — his "passing" or "transitus".

The celebration takes place on the night before his feast day and marks his transition from life on Earth to eternal life with God.

The word "transitus" comes from the Latin word for "passage" or "crossing."


